Poinsettias: Past and present



Dr. Steven Fischer, professor and horticulture program coordinator at Bergen Community College, will discuss the past, present, and future of poinsettias. The poinsettia has attracted a worldwide following as a landscape plant and a blooming plant for the holidays

since its introduction in 1825 by Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. minister to Mexico (1825-29) and an amateur botanist.

Fischer has taught horticulture at BCC since 1978. He has a B.S. degree in ornamental horticulture from Delaware Valley College of Science and Agriculture and an M.S. and Ph.D. in horticulture/entomology from the University of Maryland. His doctoral dissertation was poinsettias. Fischer is a member of the BCC Horticulture Advisory Committee and an adviser to the board of directors of the New Jersey Landscape Contractors Association (NJLCA).

Fischer will have poinsettias available for purchase.

Meet Christiane Oliveri, Class of 2013

It was Christiane Oliveri's husband, Tony, who suggested she do something for herself by enrolling in the Master Gardener program. At the time (2012), Christiane was helping their son, Michael, who has muscular dystrophy, get settled in California. She wasn't interested in gardening classes.

Meanwhile, Tony printed the application and told her all she had to do was complete the form (she did) and go for the interview (she went).

Her first semester in the MG program was rocky, she said, with those classes about bugs. But the spring semester was "glorious," she added, once perennials were on the syllabus and she met people who shared her passion for gardening.

Born in Egypt to Lebanese parents, Christiane and her three sisters and two brothers were raised in Cairo. Their neighborhood was filled with Egyptians, Greeks, Italians, Armenians, French, and British. To communicate with neighbors, you'd have to learn a few sentences in each language, she said. Christiane spoke French and Arabic at home and school. However, since she was exposed to different languages, she said it was easier for her to later learn to speak English, Italian, Spanish, and Indonesian. Currently, she's learning Portuguese via her iPhone.

When it came to choosing an occupation, "I wanted to be an artist from day 1," Christiane said. However, art was not a career path that her mother approved. Instead, her mother advised her to go to college and paint "on the side." Christiane obliged. After high school, she became an architecture student at Ain Shams University of Engineering in Cairo. It was while she was a college student that Christiane and her family attended an engagement party where she was introduced to Tony

Oliveri from Bergen County, NJ, the man who would become her husband. At the time, Tony (now retired) worked for American Express in a joint venture with an Egyptian bank called the Egyptian American Bank. They married in 1980 at the Great Pyramid of Giza and a wedding photo shows them riding a camel.

After graduation, Christiane worked as an architect before she and Tony moved to Oradell. As she explained, the yard of their hilltop home consisted of an arborvitae hedge at the back and a privet on the side. She was busy raising their two children, Lisa and Michael, so landscaping would have to wait.

After several years, Tony's job took them to Indonesia where servants helped run the house and take care of the children. Christiane learned the language and "took any classes I could get my hands on." Among those classes was Chinese brush painting. Several of her paintings are displayed in her home along with sculptures she created of clay, metal, and stone.

When they returned to Oradell in 1992, Christiane had the chance to create her garden. Michael, then about 8 or 9, wanted to earn some pocket money like his peers were earning. Christiane came up with an idea: He could help her with gardening but only if his friends were involved so the task was not too strenuous for him alone.

Christiane started by ordering two truckloads of topsoil from D'Angelo's Farm. She recalled the "Pied Piper" scene as Michael, followed by his friends each with his own wheelbarrow, ran toward the Oliveri driveway eager to work and earn some cash. As she shoveled the soil into the wheelbarrows, Michael and his friends would dump the soil into what would become her flower beds.

Christiane, 62, said her philosophy is to treat the garden as a child and coddle the root systems. "I'm constantly transplanting things," she said. "I look at the garden as a painting. If I need a pink or a blue, I go get it."

Currently, Christiane volunteers as a docent at Thielke Arboretum and will create a project for the Skylands Manor Holiday Open House. Over the years, she has volunteered in a soup kitchen and with the Border Babies program at UMDNJ in Newark.

She also founded the former T-Zone teen center that operated for six years in donated space. As many as 100 kids from River Edge and Oradell would show up on Fridays when the center was open. Christiane has also painted on silk, experimented with mosaics, and is learning to play the guitar. And, she can cook Lebanese (her mother put together a book for her with the family recipes), Egyptian, Italian, and some Asian food.
