This plant may not provide an incredible show throughout the entire season, but it contributes to the garden in ways that even members of its own family cannot attest.

For the past 17 years I have used *Aster oblongifolius* “October Skies,” commonly known as aromatic aster, in various designs and seen it at various public gardens. It struck me as a good plant, but it was not until the past few years when I came to the dumbfounded realization that this was a great plant in need of wider distribution and recognition! . . . 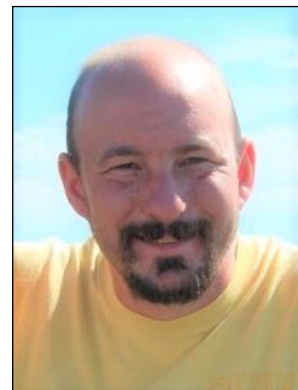

My two most-used tools in the fall are the curved, serrated knife, at left in the photo, and the hori hori knife, also known as a root knife, at right.

The curved, serrated knife is indispensable for cutting hosta leaves as well as any other perennials that need to be cut down in the fall. The hori hori knife is great not only for planting bulbs but also for digging out the roots of weeds.
